## Types of Courses

GCSEs (General Certificate of Secondary Education) are qualifications you take in a variety of subjects in Year 11. They are a stepping stone to lots of other careers and qualifications.

They are predominantly assessed by exams at the end of Year 11. Some have coursework elements.

Some of our courses are called Vocational Awards, OCR Nationals or BTECs. These are more 'applied' qualifications, each equivalent to one GCSE.

They still have final exams, but coursework completed during Year 10 and 11 counts very significantly to your grade.

The Key Stage 4 programme will be made up of a mixture of "Core" subjects and "Option" subjects.

## Core Subjects

- English Language
- English Literature
- Mathematics
- Science - most do Trilogy (2 GCSEs covering all 3 sciences), some will do 3 separate GCSEs in Biology, Chemistry and Physics
- Plus non-examined courses in... - Beliefs, Philosophy \& Ethics*
o Personal Development
o Citizenship*
- PE*

## Key Stage 4 Pathways

There are three 'Pathways' for students at Key Stage 4:

1) The English Baccalaureate Pathway (~70\% of students)
2) The Open Pathway ( $\sim 25 \%$ of students)
3) The Supported Pathway ( $\sim 5 \%$ of students)

We have allocated students to the most appropriate pathway based on all the information we have. This pathway will determine how your options are collated...

## The English Baccalaureate Pathway

## CORE SUBJECTS plus...

This pathway ensures a well balanced curriculum that will keep your options open.

The government's target is for $90 \%$ of students nationally to be on this pathway. Since we are non-selective, we allocate around $70 \%$ of students to it.

You can do both: you can put one in an open choice too...

## CORE SUBJECTS plus...

We allocate around 25\% of our students to this pathway.

You can choose more than one of History, Geography and French/German/Spanish using your open choices. You can still complete the English Baccalaureate if you wish!

## The Supported Pathway

## CORE SUBJECTS plus...

We allocate around 5\% of our students to this pathway.

The support curriculum could include IT, English and Maths functional skills qualifications as well as support for other subjects and personal and social education (life skills).

## Options form and deadline

- We'll email a Google Form personalised to your child
- Their allocated pathway (EBacc, Open or Support) will be built into the form. You return the form online.
- You need to be logged into the student's school Google account to return the form (log into Google Mail first)
- Deadline to return forms by is Friday 22nd March 2024. (This will give you first priority.)


## Reserve choice and reasons

- We do our best to give everyone their original choices, and this usually works for the vast majority of students
- However, as well as the main pathway choices, the form will also ask for one additional reserve (backup) choice
- We collect this reserve choice just in case it's needed, but usually only need it for a small number of students
- Finally, we'll ask for the reasons behind your choices...

- Never base a choice on teachers or friends
- Speak to subject teachers and form tutors
- Talk things over at home
- See our Careers Advisor, Post-16 providers and employers in the Sports Hall this evening
- Rule of three - enjoy, succeed and continue
